MEET THE EGGERS

Newly installed Concordia Seminary President Dr. Thomas J. Egger and his wife, Tori, were guest speakers at the Guild's September luncheon. Having served as a professor of Old Testament at the Seminary since 2005, Egger was called as president in February 2021. He told the Guild members at the luncheon that the church's care for pastors and deaconesses humbles him. God's Word has been a rich part of his life and that is why he chose the verse, "Your word is a lamp to my feet" (Ps. 119:105 ESV) as the theme for the 2021-22 academic year, his first year as president.

Tori, the oldest of four children, grew up in the very small town of What Cheer, Iowa, the daughter of a Pentecostal pastor. Although her parents valued mission work, Scripture and worship, it was Tom who introduced her to the true Gospel. She joined The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod in college and was married to Tom in 1991 while both were still completing their undergraduate studies. She worked in the mental health field, taught grammar school music and fourth grade, directed a children's choir and homeschooled her children for many years. She loved serving as a pastor's wife in Storm Lake, Iowa.

Now, Tori teaches English online to students in China and homeschools their two youngest children. She enjoys gardening, decorating, reading and camping.

Tori spoke about her pre-pandemic experience as being "less of everything." The Eggers have six children but only their youngest daughters, Ellen and Mary, were (Continued on Page 2)


