ABOUT THE COVER

We Have Seen His Glory captures the depth of John chapter one through vibrant colors and imagery. On the left side of the painting, John the Baptist points to the Word made flesh, the infant Jesus. Jesus shines as the only light source in the dark space. John the Gospel-writer's hand descends into the picture, pulling back this scene like a curtain and unveiling a glorious series of bright imagery. Each segment behind the curtain illustrates a moment from Jesus' ministry that reveals His glory. All of these are centered around the epitome of His glory, the cross, with the golden words, "It is finished."

The illustrations progress through the Gospel of John, starting with the first verse and ending with the last. From left to right, the illustrations depict: the Word's presence at creation, His fulfillment of the Mosaic Law, His first miracle of turning water to wine, His feeding of the 5,000, how He healed a blind man, Lazarus's grave cloths, the Son of Man lifted up like the bronze serpent, the resurrected Word's grave cloths, the angel at His empty tomb, the sending of His Spirit, Thomas' hand in His side, the miraculous catch of fish, and books that are unable to contain all of His other works.

All an average person could see from Christ's birth was a humble baby in a manger. Through the witness of John the Baptist and writings of John the Gospel-writer, we are able to see the true glory of God veiled in the flesh of a baby boy.

We Have Seen His Glory is a 24" by 36" original oil painting by Sarah Marlatt and is available to view in the chapel narthex this evening.



And behold, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you shall call his name Jesus. He will be great and will be called the Son of the Most High. 



Reading Matthew 2:1–12

L A reading from St. Matthew, the second chapter.

Now after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea in the days of Herod the king, behold, wise men from the east came to Jerusalem, saying, "Where is he who has been born king of the Jews? For we saw his star when it rose and have come to worship him." When Herod the king heard this, he was troubled, and all Jerusalem with him; and assembling all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Christ was to be born. They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea, for so it is written by the prophet:

"And you, O Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who will shepherd my people Israel."

Then Herod summoned the wise men secretly and ascertained from them what time the star had appeared. And he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child, and when you have found him, bring me word, that I too may come and worship him." After listening to the king, they went on their way. And behold, the star that they had seen when it rose went before them until it came to rest over the place where the child was. When they saw the star, they rejoiced exceedingly with great joy. And going into the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother, and they fell down and worshiped him. 
